Dear People of Christ Church,

As the Stewardship campaign this fall will demonstrate, all of these ministries are connected and together compose the church.


Celebration of Holy Baptism

Outreach Committee

Stuff the Bus for Bright Futures

For August, the Outreach Committee wants to highlight Bright Futures. Bright Futures is a Winchester/ Frederick County non-profit organization that focuses on the health and welfare of the children of our community. Other than the food pack program that Christ Church regularly supports, other programs they provide are the annual "stuff the bus," where school supplies are collected to share with the students and teachers; a summer food assistance program, where a school bus delivers family-sized food boxes from the Blue Ridge area food pantry to several locations in the area for students and their families to pick up; a holiday assistance program, where in 2022, just under 1000 kids were sponsored by individuals in the community and given gifts. They are also "on call" to provide needed items for students and their families.

The Vestry and the Outreach Committee are committed to Bright Futures because the congregation has shown that they want to support this ministry. Since 2014, Christ Church has been involved in packing food for the students. Once called Panda Pantry, volunteers packed 30 bags a week. Now under the auspices of Bright Futures, volunteers pack one to two times a month, 500 bags each time. Also, we are the only church that donates money monthly to the packing program. The Outreach Committee uses money from the operating budget, the Marie Cooper Fund, and the sale of the Apple Blossom tickets to help fund this ministry.

Every August, Bright Futures holds their "Stuff the Bus" campaign to collect school supplies as the school year starts. This year you can help by donating backpacks, highlighters, dry erase markers, colored pencils, glue sticks, and boys' long jogger pants (or sweatpants). These are their highest-need items, and we'll be receiving them at church throughout August. Donations can be brought to church on Sunday mornings, or dropped off at the Church Office at on Wednesdays from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm.

You can also volunteer for a shift helping Bright Futures collect items on Saturday, August 5th. They need volunteers to cover two hour shifts at Walmart Stephens City, Pleasant Valley, Rt. 50, and Apple Blossom Mall. There is a link to sign up on our website

Lectionary Bible Study on Zoom




From the Finance Committee

First Half 2023 Update

The first half of 2023 financial picture has been moderately positive for the church. Our revenues through the first six months are better than projected, so thank you to all who have contributed. Overall, revenue is 12% ahead of budget projections.

The graph below reflects the actual year-to-date deficit being less than expected. It also shows us what typically happens during the summer months—our revenues move in a deficit direction, a period of stagnation or slump. While it is expected, it does have a significant impact on our cash flow and our accounting reserves. So, please keep up with your pledges and donations during our slow revenue months!

Final reminder on this: The Employee Retention Credit (ERC) program from the federal government was a program to help organizations to retain their employees during the pandemic. We benefited significantly from this program, receiving \$55,470.51 (not shown in the graph as it is outside our operating budget) this year alone. But the program has ended and we are on our own next year.



The Diocesan canons require an annual audit of the church's financial records. The audit is underway, and this year, Christopher Francis is chairing the Audit Committee, working with Theresa Seitz, the bookkeeper, and three volunteers. The church is using an internal audit program based on the Diocesan *Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs*. This internal audit program is a usable and proactive process for the audit committee to assure the congregation of their financial position. Results of the audit will be published in a future newsletter.

Looking toward the Stewardship Campaign

August is here already, and summer is winding down. Our children will be getting ready for school and fall sports; Halloween candy is already on the shelves; and most of us will be settling into our normal routines. This is a great time to reflect on the summer fun and time we enjoyed with our family and friends. - Worship is where we give thanks and praise, are fed, renewed and sent out. It prepares us to take part in parish life, formation, pastoral care and outreach.
- Outreach is an extension of our worship where we live out God's commandment to love and serve our neighbor.

In the upcoming months, you will be hearing more about each of these ministries and how they rely, not only on members to support the work, but also on pledged funds to keep up with the costs of providing services. Although we may be back to the "new normal," our donations and pledged funds are considerably lower than pre-pandemic levels. There is also a need for volunteers to help with these ministries.

We all have different gifts, abilities, and personalities that were designed by God so that we can love and serve Him and others. God is generous and supplies us with everything we need to be generous. Let's celebrate the gifts each member has by learning more about these ministries, and how we can help support them with our time, talent and treasure to the glory of God.

So, let's listen to our generous hearts so that we can shape the future of Christ Episcopal Church!

What is Stewardship?

Some of us recognize that every fall, Christ Church asks us to pledge a contribution for the following year so that the Finance Committee can make a budget and understand what is supported and what programs may not be. But there is so much more to stewardship than that. Tens is The Episcopal Network for Stewardship and provides valuable resources as congregations develop stewardship campaigns. They say:

"Stewardship is not just the pledge campaign — it is how we approach our relationship with each other and all of God's gifts to us all year round. Whatever the resources we have been given is what we must work with to accomplish the mission of the church — these include our time, our talent, and our treasure, and they work together to grow the Reign of God."

From the Pastoral Care Committee

The Role of the Parish Nurses

In the June/July Angelus issue, the congregation was introduced to our new Parish Nurse, Susan Francis. In this issue, we provide a look into the parish nurses' role at Christ Church.

The parish nurses are registered nurses in the state were they reside and have met many criteria: interviewed by the pastor, have more than two years of experience in nursing, and have had educational preparation in holistic ministry. The nurse assists parishioners in gaining mental, physical, and spiritual health by complementing the ministry provided by the pastor (rector/priest) and lay ministers. This means he/she provides special health promotion services within a given faith community. The parish nurse is someone who wants to work in the faith community, is a good listener, shows compassion, empathy, and is able to make sound health decisions. Other attributes that come to mind: self-starter, independent thinker, and has made a conscious partnering of health issues with the faith of the parishioner and his/her family. The core to this practice is that the parish nurse serves as a bridge to better health in the following roles:

- Health counselor and promoter
- Educator of holistic health (promote understanding of the relationship between lifestyle, attitudes, faith, and well-being)
- Advocate/resource/referral agent---answer questions related to health and care
- Liaison with community services
- Teacher of volunteers/support groups
- Healer of spirit, mind and body (serves as a member of church staff and in partnership with the pastor)

The services provided by the parish nurse are determined by the needs of the faith community in which he/she serves. Some of the services/programs might include:

- Blood pressure screening
- Classes for all ages (nutrition, exercises, elderly parent care, stress management, etc.)
- Hospital, nursing home, or home visits to assist health needs
- Special prayers for healing
- Assist with referrals for appropriate community resources
- Provide health tips

The parish nurse provides support for church members as a partner of the ministerial team. The core to this practice is the intentional care of the spirit. The nurse is familiar with motivational and empowering techniques to encourage lifestyle changes. Parish nurses can make suggestions and encourage progress but, only the parishioner can make those healthy changes.
