Dear People of Christ Church,

Happy new year from the clergy and staff! We hope that you had a safe and healthy Christmas and New Year's celebrations. I also want to thank everyone who helped us with our Christmas Eve services and First Night hosting. I have said it before, but I want to say it again: it is far more wonderful to celebrate our Lord's birth with other people in the sanctuary than simply speaking to a video camera!



Heading into the new year, we will continue with our weekly practice of plan, adapt, and be safe. That means that we will continue with our current worship practices and times on Sunday mornings unless the health department gives us different recommendations. We will be sure to include any changes in our Thursday email communications, so be sure that you subscribe. For our Sunday School programs, we will go from week to week as to whether we will have Sunday School on the following Sunday. Again, we will use the Thursday email communications to let you know if Sunday School programs will be offered on the following Sunday.

While we watch the rates of infection in the next few weeks, we will continue to have our Wednesday Bible Study online and our Monday Faith Study online until we see what the rates are doing. As health direction becomes clear, we will use some of our hybrid capabilities for studies to allow both in person and online participation. That will be announced as we move ahead.

As far as our Adult Forums, when we gather, we will be discussing where we are as a diocese. 2022 will have the election of a new bishop, and 2022 and 2023 will also see programs and ministries of the diocese coming back online. Therefore, the clergy will lead conversations to help us know what is going on and what ways we can be involved.

This past Christmas saw the Anglican Communion lose one of our giants with the death of Archbishop Desmond Tutu. His leadership, preaching and teaching are well known around the world. To celebrate his life, I will be leading a book study on one of my favorite Desmond Tutu books, *God Has a Dream*. As this is not a long book, the study will be for four weeks. I am still working on the logistics for it, but initially, it will be on Zoom and will not start until the latter part of January. So more information will be coming.

Please remember that the hope for the near future is healthy, safe ways to gather with that most grand idea of no masking is the place we all want to be. Our plan is not to stay where we are, but rather to plan, adapt and change as we can. We had hoped that 2021 would see us in a very different place from 2020 as far as the pandemic and vaccinations. We shall see what happens in 2022. For all of the anger and frustrations we have with the pandemic, as I remember that joyful feeling of seeing people on Christmas Eve, I become all the more convinced that God is with us through this and all of the joys and challenges of life. I look forward to that time when we are able to show our compassion and concern for one another without having to wear a mask. I am also grateful for our ongoing desire to make sure we are safe and healthy in the immediate future.

From the Clergy

Welcome to 2022! Many of us take the New Year as a time for reflection and planning, a chance to take the time to think about what happened in the previous year, what went well and what didn't, and how we want the year ahead to be different. Although I'm sure we're all familiar with the challenge of actually keeping our New Year's resolutions, I think the habit is a useful one. It helps us to be thoughtful and deliberate about how we live our lives. This includes our spiritual lives - New Year's can be a wonderful opportunity to take stock, to renew our commitment to God, and to think about how we can best express that commitment in the New Year.

There are two different levels to consider as we think about our spiritual New Year's resolution. The more direct level is the question of what we are doing, and what we may need to start (or stop) doing. This is about the specifics of our spiritual lives - do you need to look for a new practice of prayer, or reading Scripture? Is your life in need of a new way of being in service to others, or is it time to think about your practices around money? Taking on something new, or shifting direction in something you were already doing, can help us find some new purpose and direction, particularly if part of your spiritual life has started to feel stuck, in need of some new energy.

But the deeper and richer level to our resolutions is the question of why, of what our goals are. Like any habit, we take on spiritual practices in order to cultivate something within ourselves. The overall goal is the same for all of us as Christians - growing in the love of God and neighbor - but all of us have particular ways we may need to work at that. It may be growing in patience, or learning to pay better attention to God's voice, or cultivating the gift of kindness to others. The best spiritual growth comes when the two levels go together - when the practices we take on help us grow in the particular virtues we need.

Like any resolution, resolutions about our spiritual life can feel like work. But they are unique in that they aren't ultimately resolutions about ourselves. Instead, they are chances to go deeper into life with God, to learn more about our neighbors around us, to grow in love and relationship. There is real and deep joy in this even when it's hard work. So whatever circumstances we may find ourselves in 2022, let us resolve to grow in Christ's love. And may that resolve carry us through the whole year ahead.

Monthly Trends

Revenues: Over the first 11 months we have had 5 months where Actual Revenues has exceeded budget and 6 months where Actual Revenues were less than budget. Unfortunately, the past three months (September through November) have all been months where Actual Revenues were lower than budget. We are hoping that end of year donations will help Actual December Revenue meet or exceed budget.

Expenses: Actual Expenses have had a similar trend -5 months where Actual Expense values were less than budget and 6 months where Actual Expense values exceeded budget.

Year-To-Date

Looking at the year-to-date values you can see that we are actually doing better than budget! Actual Revenue is about \$39,800 greater than budget and actual Expenses are about \$5,800 less than budget. The Actual YTD net position is much better than budget as well – unfortunately it is still quite negative at \$ - 61,848.

How will the year 2021 end?

As of the 15th of December, we know:

- Our December Budget values, and that
- The PPP Loan for 2021 can be added to December's Actual Revenue

But we DO NOT know:



Raise your hand if you had chocolate goodies during the holidays! I reviewed an article just before Christmas that caught my attention. It was a groundbreaking study published in *Neurology* that suggests the answer to saving your memory, cutting your risk of dementia by 48%, and turning your brain's age back 30 years may be hidden in chocolate, which is rich with naturally occurring flavanols!

What foods contain flavanols? In addition to dark chocolate (dark has more flavanols than milk or white chocolate), good sources are green and black tea, cocoa, nuts, soybeans, and those delicious berries (strawberries, raspberries, and blackberries). Research shows that consumption of flavanols helps lower high blood pressure by improving arterial vessels tone and improving blood flow, and may help prevent Type II diabetes and decrease cardiovascular risk factors.

Don't stop your prescribed medications! This is just "food for thought." Continue to exercise and enjoy your tea and chocolate!
